CHILD PROTECTION POLICY (CPP)

Raj Luxmi Samvid Gurukulam Sainik School implement Child Protection policies focusing on strict discipline, anti-bullying (no harassment), restricted communication, secure campus, and specific procedures for reporting misconduct, often involving the Principal/Disciplinary Committee. POCSO Act awareness, child rights, and helpline 1098 to ensure a safe environment, preventing harm and fostering good conduct through rules, reporting, and staff vigilance.

Key Pillars of Sainik School Child Protection:

- Strict Code of Conduct: Cadets must follow rules against bullying, harassment, cheating, lying, and disobeying staff.
- 2. **Secure Environment:** Restricted entry, no personal money/phones, and controlled communication channels (school app/email) for parents to ensure safety.
- 3. **Reporting Mechanisms:** Formal procedures for reporting issues, involving class teachers, counsellors, and the Disciplinary Committee, with parents informed for serious offenses.
- Awareness & Training: Cadets are educated on child rights, POCSO Act, and reporting mechanisms (like Helpline 1098) by experts.
- Staff Responsibility: Staff must maintain confidentiality but share critical info with designated personnel, acting professionally to protect children.

Specific Rules & Procedures:

- Discipline: Cadets report misconduct; they must not indulge in activities that bring disrepute.
- Communication: Parents use official channels (App/email); no unnecessary calls or visits.
- Prohibited Items: Mobile phones, smartwatches, and excessive money are banned.
- Out-of-Bounds Areas: Cadets must avoid designated restricted zones.
- Handling Misconduct: First-time trivial offenses are counselled; repeat offenders face warnings, parent summons, or suspension.

Focus on POCSO:

There's a growing focus on the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, with awareness programs to empower cadets and staff on legal reporting and child rights. In essence, Sainik School aim to create a disciplined, monitored, and rights-aware environment making child protection a shared responsibility of cadets, staff, and parents, with formal systems for safeguarding against abuse and promoting ethical behaviour.
